We also heard from Donna Lang of the Greening Sacred Spaces project of the interfaith organization Faith and the Common Good. She has arranged for the grant from the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation that has enabled CCDP to purchase 70 plants that will be delivered to us in May. Donna also announced that she had received confirmation just that day that Scotts Canada would also be donating pallets of mulch and soil to us for the pollinator garden. That shipment will arrive in mid-April, and we will need a group of volunteers to spread the soil and mulch in the new garden. Brad Lennon has tentatively set the date of April 20th for that work party, so please let him know if you can help with that work. - 10. TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: In 2019, the federal government passed Bill C-92, a law returning child welfare services to individual Indigenous communities. This law included clauses allowing Indigenous communities to pass their own laws which could supersede provincial ones. The province of Quebec appealed to have Bill C-92 overturned, arguing that nothing other than federal law could supersede its own. On February 9th, the Supreme Court ruled that Bill C-92 is constitutional and said that it "protects the well-being of Indigenous children, youth and families by promoting the delivery of culturally appropriate child and family services and, in so doing, advances the process of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples."
- **11. CLIMATE ACTION GROUP:** Given the scale of the challenge of emissions reduction, the threat of drought in a drying climate, and that existing non-emitting sources like hydro may become less abundant, society must recognize there will be less energy available in the future. Investments in efficiency and conservation coupled with behavioural change could minimize the shock.
