Listening to God – Second Reading		

Reader: A Reading from the First Letter of John.

My much-loved friends, love each other, for love comes from the Great Spirit. All who love have been born of him and know him. Those who do not love do not know him, for the Great Spirit is love. Creator showed his love for us by sending the only Son who fully represents him into this world, so that we could live through him. This is love, not that we loved Creator, but that he loved us and proved his love by sending his Son to take on himself the burden of our broken ways. My much-loved friends, if Creator loved us like that, then we should also love each other. No one

has ever seen the Great Spirit, but as long as we love each other, he remains in us, and his love is made complete in us. We know that we live in him and he lives in us because Creator has shared his Spirit with us. We have seen and now tell you the truth about what our Father the Great Spirit has done. He sent his Son to be the Sacred Deliverer of the world. Those who tell others that Creator Sets Free (Jesus) is the Son of the Great Spirit are the ones Creator lives in, and they live in him. We have come to know and trust the love Creator has for us. The Great Spirit is love. He remains in those who love and keep on loving, and they remain in him. Love is made complete in us so that we will stand without fear on the day Creator decides who has done right or wrong. For in this world, when we love as he loves, we are just like him. Where love is there can be no fear, for mature love drives all fear away. Fear comes from the thought of punishment. So love has not yet matured in those who continue to be afraid. We love because he first loved us. If we say that we love the Great Spirit but hate others, then we are speaking with a forked tongue. If we do not love someone we can see, then how can we love a Creator we cannot see? And from him we have been given this instruction: the pens who love the Great Spirit must also love the members of his family.

Long ago, in the time before all days, before the creation of all things, the one who is known as the Word was there face to face with the Great Spirit. This Word fully represents Creator and shows us who he is and what he is like. He has always been there from the beginning, for the Word and Creator are one and the same. Through the Word all things came into being, and not one thing exists that he did not create. Creator's life shined out from the Word, giving light to all human beings. This is the true Light that comes to all the peoples of the world and shines on everyone. The Light shines into the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it or put it out. Into the wilderness of the Land of Promise (Judea) came a man named Gift of Goodwill (John). He was sent by the Great Spirit to tell what he knew about the Light so everyone could believe. He was not the Light but came to speak the truth about the Light. The true Light that shines on all people was coming into the darkness of the world. He came down into this world, and even though he made all things, the world did not recognize him. Even his own tribe did not welcome or honour him. But all who welcome and trust him receive their birthright as children of the Great Spirit. They are born in a new way, not from a human father's plans or desires, but born from above - by the Great Spirit. Creator's Word became a fleshand-blood human being and pitched his sacred tent among us, living as one of us. We looked upon his great beauty and saw how honourable he was, the kind of honour held only by this one Son who fully represents his Father – full of his great kindness and truth. Gift of Goodwill (John) told what he knew about him and cried out with a loud voice, "The one I have told you about is here! He comes after me, but is much greater – my elder! He has more honour, for even though he is thought to be younger, he existed before I was born." From the fullness of his being we have all had many gifts of kindness poured out on us. Drawn from the Water (Moses) gave us our tribal laws, but the gift of great kindness and truth came from Creator Sets Free (Jesus), the Chosen One. No one has ever seen the Great Spirit, but the one Son, who is himself the Great Spirit and closest to the Father's heart, has shown us what he is like. John 1:1-18 (First Nations Translation)

Gospeller: The Gospel of Christ.

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Homily

The Apostles' Creed

Presider: Let us confess the faith of our baptism, as we say,

All: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

We lament apathy in the face of the need for change, change that recognizes the sovereignty of the First Peoples and recognizes at long last, in ways that make a difference, the sacredness of the land and the need for all of us to walk humbly upon it.

Lord in your mercy,

- All: Hear our prayer.
- Leader: Hear us now as we pray for those hurting and in pain in all our communities: For anyone worn down by systemic racism, including by government and by the church, that settler Canadians and those with power will change their thinking and how they live so justice will finally come. Lord in your mercy,
- All: Hear our prayer.
- Leader: For survivors of residential schools, and their families that continue to live with that legacy, that justice will finally come. Lord in your mercy,
- All: Hear our prayer.

Leader: For those Indigenous women and girls who are among the thousands of murdered and missing, for them and their families, we are grieved by what has happened and we pledge to advocate for their safety, that justice will finally come. Lord in your mercy,

All: Hear our prayer.

Leader: For the air, that all might breathe it clean and free, that justice might finally come. For the waters—marshlands, lakes, rivers, streams. For the great seas and oceans. That they might be protected for the benefit of seven generations hence, that justice will finally come.

Lord in your mercy,

- All: Hear our prayer.
- Leader: For the lands, forests, grass, and farmlands. For the prairies, foothills, and mountains. For their beauty, for the life that teems within, upon, and over them, for the reprioritization of the health of ecosystems over profit, so justice will finally come. Lord in your mercy,

All: Hear our prayer.

Leader: For the animals, birds, fish, and life of all kinds whose viability is being threatened by unsustainable human activity, that their lives will begin to count so that justice will finally come.

Lord in your mercy,

All: Hear our prayer.

Leader: All this, as well as the prayers of our hearts, O God, we lift up to you. Hear our celebrations as we claim anew our kinship with you and with all our relations. Hear our laments, and grow our hearts full of compassion for self and other as we leave this place to be a better friend and neighbour to all. We pray in the name of Creator, who is Mother and Father of us all. We pray as well in the Spirit of Christ, whose words continue to guide our lives today. **Amen.**

Composer's note: "This song is about a community coming together to prepare a feast – to celebrate 'the gift' of traditions and the transmission of knowledge. A traditional song will have a certain name or title but it is the context in which it is sung that denotes the true meaning. The lyrics in this song are not words in any language, but they are based on Aboriginal vocables from the western part of North America." The composer, Russell Wallace, is a member of the Lil'wat Nation and has performed and composed many songs based on this genre.

Thomas Commuck's (1804-1855) hymnal, "Indian Melodies", published in 1845, is regarded to be one of the first notated and published musical works by a Native American composer. Commuck was of Narragansett heritage, but spent much of his life amongst the Brothertown peoples (an indigenous tribe now based in Wisconsin). Commuck set many English hymn texts (including this famous text by Isaac Watts) to new tunes, which he named for significant Indigenous peoples and places.
