Presider: Let us prepare ourselves for the Word of God as it comes to us in the reading of

Holy Scripture.

All: Our hearts and minds are open.

# **Listening to God – First Reading**

(please be seated)

Reader: A reading from the Book of Exodus.

The LORD spoke to Moses and said, 'I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, "At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the LORD your God." ' Exodus 16:11-12

Reader: Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Church.

All: Thanks be to God.

Psalm 22 G. Johnston

At every service, we have an opportunity to sing from the Bible itself. Psalms have been an integral part of Judeo-Christian worship throughout the ages; when we sing the psalms, we are singing texts that Jesus himself also prayed. The 150 psalms include songs of praise and thanksgiving, laments, and retellings of salvation history, and thereby provide us a model with how to pray and respond to God in the many circumstances we face in our lives. Many methods of singing psalms have developed through the centuries; today, we will use a "responsorial psalm," which features a short refrain sung by all, and verses sung by the cantor.

# **Gospel Acclamation**

(please stand as you are able)

Except during Lent, we sing an "Alleluia" which means "praise the Lord." This is followed by "a sentence" sung by the cantor, which encapsulates a key theme of the Gospel message. Sometimes, in Anglican worship, a hymn will replace the Alleluia. This is commonly referred to as a "sequence hymn," which draws its name from a genre of hymnody that historically followed the Alleluia.

# **Celebrating the Eucharist**

(please remain standing)

The Great Thanksqiving

Presider: The Lord be with you.

All: And also with you.

Presider: Lift up your hearts.

All: We lift them up to the Lord.

Presider: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Presider:

We give you thanks and praise, almighty God, through your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Redeemer. He is your living Word, through whom you have created all things.

By the power of the Holy Spirit he took flesh of the Virgin Mary and shared our human nature. He lived and died as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

In fulfilment of your will he stretched out his hands in suffering, to bring release to those who place their hope in you; and so he won for you a holy people.


He chose to bear our griefs and sorrows, and to give up his life on the cross, that he might shatter the chains of evil and death, and banish the darkness of sin and despair. By his resurrection he brings us into the light of your presence.

Now with all creation we raise our voices to proclaim the glory of your name.

#### Sanctus & Benedictus

The text of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy) is drawn directly from Biblical passages (Isaiah 6:3 and Revelation 4:8). It is the prayer said to be sung by the angels eternally around the throne of God. The preface, which comes just before the Sanctus, beautifully alludes to the belief that when we worship, it is not just us praying here and now, but rather, we are joining with all the angels, saints, and the Church throughout the world in an eternal chorus of praise.

The second half of the Sanctus, known as the Benedictus, quotes the phrase "blessed is he who comes in the names of Lord," which welcomed Jesus as he entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. In the context of the Eucharistic prayer, this phrase reminds us that we believe that Jesus is soon coming to be present in our midst through the sacrament of the Eucharist.

Holy and gracious God, accept our praise, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ; who on the night he was handed over to suffering and death, took bread and gave you thanks, saying, "Take, and eat: this is my body which is broken for you." In the same way he took the cup, saying, "This is my blood which is shed for you. When you do this, you do it in memory of me."

Remembering, therefore, his death and resurrection, we offer you this bread and this cup, giving thanks that you have made us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

We ask you to send your Holy Spirit upon the offering of your holy Church. Gather into one all who share in these sacred mysteries, filling them with the Holy Spirit and confirming their faith in the truth, that together we may praise you and give you glory through your Servant, Jesus Christ.



# All are welcome to receive communion with us


As the sidespeople pass your pew, please line up in the centre aisle.

- To receive a blessing, as you reach the priest with the bread, cross your arms over your chest. Return to your seat after receiving the blessing.
- To receive the bread, hold your hands in front of you, palms up.
- To receive the wine from the cup, take the bottom of the cup and the base and guide it to your mouth.
- If you prefer to take only the bread, you may indicate this to the cup bearer by crossing your arms over your chest, or simply walking past them.

# **Agnus Dei**

During the Breaking of the Bread, the Agnus Dei is often sung. This litany-like prayer is based on the words of John 1:29, in which John the Baptist hails Jesus as the Lamb of God. The Lamb of God is one of the traditional text of the Mass Ordinary (the parts of the service that don't change from week to week), and has been set to music by countless composers through the ages, although other fraction chants such as "Christ Our Passover Is Sacrificed For Us," often used during Eastertide, are given as options in the Book of Alternative Services.

#### **Communion Motet**

The choir, through training and regular practice, is able to offer music that is more complex than what the congregation can manage. Just as stained-glass and glorious architecture stand as testaments to our faith and can inspire us, so too can artistic music help us lift our hearts and minds to God and more deeply explore the mysteries of our faith. We believe that encountering beauty can be a path toward transcendence and discovering more about God, the source of all that is good, true and beautiful. Here at CCDP, the choir sings music from the Middle Ages through to the works of living composers, drawing on the rich body of liturgical repertoire from the Anglican tradition and beyond.

The term "motet" is often used to describe the choir's offerings. The term comes from the French word "mot" meaning "word," which designates that it is a texted piece of polyphonic vocal music, especially one in Latin, the language which dominated much of the Western church's history till the Reformation. The term "anthem" is also occasionally used to describe choral pieces, especially sacred music with English texts.

This is an easy hike with a few gentle hills over a mix of paved and gravel trails through a forest ecosystem and the city's ravines. You'll be alongside Yellow Creek for part of the hike,



surrounded by maple and oak trees. Distance: 4 kilometres (an hour at a leisurely pace) from David Balfour Park to The Evergreen Brickworks. Bring at least 1L water, sunscreen protection, a packed lunch if you wish (although there are food concessions at the Brickworks Farmers Market Food Court) and proper footwear. A free Shuttle Bus runs every 30-45 minutes to Broadview Station. TTC service is also available via the 28 Bayview South bus to Davisville subway station. In the afternoon you can extend your hike on the Evergreen Brickworks trail system. You can also opt to join Brad Lennon for a longer hike to complete the loop back to the church via Moore Park Ravine and Mount Pleasant Cemetery. - 12. TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: On July 25th, the Senate released a report called Missing Records, Missing Children. This report follows an investigation into the difficulties with accessing residential school records. These records are held in many different places (including federal and provincial government agencies and church organizations) and can often be missing, incomplete, difficult to access, and disorganized or poorly indexed. The report made 11 recommendations, including that the Government of Canada provide further funding to organizations like the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation (NCTR) so they can improve access and quality of the records; that the Government work to remove legal barriers to Indigenous access to the records; and that the Government compel Catholic entities to release their residential school records to the NCTR.
