10.A SPIRITUAL PATH: WORSHIP AMONG THE FALL COLOURS: Mount Pleasant Cemetery is not only known as the final resting place for many prominent Canadians. It is also one of the most beautiful places to see fall foliage. Come join the Rev. Dr. Stephen Drakeford, our interim priest-incharge, as he and Brad Lennon lead a walk on Saturday, October 19, at 10 a.m. from the CCDP steps into and through the cemetery. The landscaping of Mount Pleasant was developed in



the late nineteenth century to provide an arboretum for public enjoyment. Thus, hundreds of varieties of trees grow there, ranging from rare, introduced trees to oaks that were mature when Mount Pleasant Cemetery was founded. Practically every tree that will grow in this climate is found there. The trees should be spectacular at the time of our walk. At the other end of the cemetery, our hike will continue into Crowther's Woods, a mature maple, beech, and oak Carolinian woodland where many of the trees are over a century old. Our hike will cover 9 km of trail and last about four hours, ending at the Brickworks. A free shuttle bus runs from there to Broadview Station, or we can take the #28 TTC bus back to Davisville Station. register for this hike to ask auestions. - **13.PASTORAL CALLS:** An integral part of Christian community is to support one another through times of joy and celebration and also times of grief and confusion. - **14.TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP:** On September 18th, the Canadian Medical Association officially apologized for its role in the harms caused by the medical system to Indigenous people. These harms range from forced sterilization of Indigenous women, to medical experimentation on children in residential schools, to the forced removal of Inuit to tuberculosis sanatoriums far from their home communities. It was a doctor, chief medical officer of the Department of Indian Affairs Peter Bryce, who first reported on horrifying health conditions in residential schools in 1922; nonetheless, health organizations such as the CMA failed to take action to improve these conditions. Indigenous people in Canada still experience significant disparities in health: for instance, life expectancy ranges from 7-12 years shorter than the Canadian average in areas with predominantly Métis, First Nations, or Inuit populations.
- 15.CLIMATE ACTION GROUP: Two-thirds of North American birds are at increasing risk of extinction from global temperature rise. As the climate changes, so will the places birds need. Audubon scientists took advantage of 140 million observations, recorded by birders and scientists, to describe where 604 North American bird species live today—an area known as their "range." They then used the latest climate models to project how each species's range will shift as climate change and other human impacts advance across the continent. The results are clear: Birds will be forced to relocate to find favorable homes. And they may survive.
