NOTE FROM CLERGY:** One of the things that has come to the attention of the clergy on Sunday mornings is the tight turnaround between services leaving little time for us to mingle over coffee and speak with each other. - 6. SHARE WARMTH THIS FALL: Our Community Breakfast program doesn't just feed people: we pass out seasonal essentials such as clothing and boots. This fall, we are in need of the following: new winter socks; gently used men's and women's sweaters, hoodies, winter coats, shoes, boots, slippers, gloves, hats, and scarves. Please bring your donations on a Sunday or throughout the week and drop them off in the bin in the Atrium. Our guests are very appreciative thank you!
- **7. JAZZ VESPERS:** This informal service of prayers, a reflection, and lots of jazz, now happens twice per month. The next two upcoming services are on October 27th and November 10th at 4:30pm. For details about which musicians are playing, please visit our website.
- **8. PASTORAL CALLS:** An integral part of Christian community is to support one another through times of joy and celebration and also times of grief and confusion. - **9. TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP:** On September 30th, the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, the Spirit Garden officially opened at Nathan Phillips Square. The garden was developed as a response to Call to Action 82 from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which calls for a Residential Schools Monument to be established in every capital city to honour the children who attended residential schools. The creation of the memorial was led by the Toronto Council Fire Native Cultural Centre. The garden features a limestone turtle which sits in a reflecting pool on which the names of the 18 residential schools in Ontario are carved. The garden also includes a teaching lodge, a stainless-steel spirit canoe, an inukshuk, and a Three Sisters garden planted with squash, beans, and corn. As well as a space for reflection, the garden will also be used for ceremonies and teaching.
- **10.CLIMATE ACTION GROUP:** As the earth warms, species are leaving their ancestral homes, those on land are relocating up in elevation or poleward at a respective rate of forty vertical feet and eleven miles every decade. Ocean dwellers are now doing so at a rate of 45 miles per decade. These species are attempting, in part, to track their thermal niche, the temperature in which they are most likely to survive and thrive. The question is whether migration can save them in time. Not all environments are suitable for every species, and animals shift and migrate at different paces based on a range of factors. Will they reach a suitable climate before it's too late?

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We acknowledge that the land on which we worship is the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee (ho-den-oh-show-nee), and Anishinabek (ah-nish-nah-bek) Nations, and most recently, the territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit. This territory is part of the Dish with One Spoon Treaty, an agreement between the Anishinabek, Haudenosaunee, and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes.

Today, Toronto is still home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island (North America) and we seek to live in respect, peace, and right relations with them as we meet and worship on this territory. We are grateful for the resources we are using, and honour all the First Nations, Métis, and Inuit people who have been living on this land since time immemorial.
