



Parents of Sergeant Pilot Raymond Ferrier were notified yesterday of the death of their son in action with the air force overseas. It is believed he was in an RAF Hurricane squadron, operating in Scotland.

Sergt. Pilot Ferrier only recently wrote home to his parents, who live on Roslyn avenue. ronto, that he had had tea with the King and Queen. It was only a month ago that he wrote describing a visit to Buckingham Pal-

"The King and Queen,

with the two Princesses, walked in followed by their Cairn terriers," he wrote, "It was really wonderful. We were all introduced to the King and Queen personally. The King asked about our trip over and about our training. I spent a good deal of time with the Princesses, who are really marvellous."

Sergt. Pilot Ferrier's father lost a leg in the Great War, and his uncle, R.S.M. Alexander Ferrier of the Black Watch, won the D.C.M. A brother is with the signallers overseas.

## CCDP WALKING GROUP - CELEBRATING CHRIST'S REIGN ON A SPIRITUAL WALK:

Stephen Drakeford and Brad Lennon will lead an 8 km urban hike on the day just before Advent begins, Saturday, November 30. **CLIMATE ACTION GROUP:** For every 1C rise in average temperature, the atmosphere can hold about 7% more moisture.
