Samuel Coleridge Taylor

Samuel Coleridge Taylor (1875-1912) was a composer and conductor of Sierra Leonean and British heritage. He studied with renowned English composer C.V. Stanford. Edward Elgar also helped him launch his career. During Coleridge Taylor's life, his music was frequently performed and acclaimed, however, after his death much of his music went out of print and was largely forgotten. It is only in recent years that his music has started to regain attention, particularly because it brings together European Classical, African and West Indian musical traditions.

Closing Hymn

"Lift Every Voice and Sing," sometimes referred to as the "Black National Anthem," was written by James W. Johnson, an African-American writer and civil rights activist. His brother, John R. Johnson, then set it to music. It was first performed on February 12, 1900 at a commemoration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday held at the Jacksonville, Florida middle-school where James Johnson was principal. The song was published, was used as a rallying cry during the civil rights movement, and has since been performed at numerous gatherings and major public events, having especially gained prominence in 2020 after the death of George Floyd. Rich with biblical imagery, the hymn appears in numerous hymnals of various denominations and James Weldon Johnson is commemorated on the US Episcopal Church's calendar.

Postlude

Dr. André J. Thomas (b. 1952) is an African-American choral composer and educator well-known for his arrangement of spirituals. "Joshua Fit The Battle," ("fit" being a dialect word for "fought") is based on the biblical story of how the walls of Jericho fell after the Israelites marched around them for seven days. The tune was likely composed in the early nineteenth century. For enslaved peoples the lyrics "and the walls came tumbling down" may have alluded to the hope for freedom.

SERVICE CELEBRATES BLACK HERITAGE OF THE CHURCH: The first service celebrating the Black heritage of the Church in the Diocese of Toronto was held on Feb. 25, 1996, at St. James Cathedral. To mark the 30th anniversary of this event, the cathedral is inviting Anglicans across the Diocese to a Eucharistic celebration of the life and ministry of Black Anglicans in the Diocese on Feb. 23 at 4:30 p.m. The preacher will be the Rev. Canon Dr. Stephen Fields.

BLACK HERITAGE AT CHRIST CHURCH DEER PARK: After consultation with some members of our community of African Heritage, we have decided to honour the contributions of Black Christians in February by:

He and Brad Lennon will be leading our visit there and to the historic St. Andrew's-by-the-Lake Anglican Church located on Centre Island. SOCIAL JUSTICE

CLIMATE ACTION GROUP: Carbon dioxide (CO2) levels in the Earth's atmosphere have reached levels not seen for millions of years, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) declared in 2022. The last time CO2 levels were this high, more than four million years ago, sea levels were somewhere between five and 25 metres (16-82 feet) higher than they are now, the agency adds. There's enough glacial ice in Greenland alone to raise sea levels about twenty-five feet. Greenland lost a record 12.5 billion tons of ice in just one day in August 2019.

TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: For Neskantaga First Nation, 436 kilometers northeast of Thunder Bay, Feb 1st was the 30th year of a boil water advisory. Imagine we have Canadians living in places where they can not drink their water. The history of trying to get the old water plant to work is long, convoluted and expensive but the outcome is still the same. There's a lot of frustration that the Ford government prioritizes spending lots of money on roads for mining companies but not for water for people to drink. In Canada at the moment, 31 Indigenous reserves are under long-term drinking water advisories; but there is some good news: as of Nov 2024, 147 "boil water advisories" have been lifted since 2015.
