Prelude Hymn to Freedom

Today, the Anglican Church of Canada marks "Freedom Sunday," which invites us to stand in solidarity with victims of human trafficking and other dehumanizing crimes. As we also conclude Black History month celebrations, Canadian jazz legend Oscar Peterson's "Hymn to Freedom" is an especially fitting way to pray for freedom for all people. Composed in 1962, it was adopted as an anthem of the civil rights movement. The text of this hymn, written by Harriette Hamilton, is as follows:

When every heart joins every heart and together yearns for liberty, that's when we'll be free. When every hand joins every hand and together moulds our destiny, that's when we'll be free. Any hour, any day, the time soon will come when we will live in dignity, that's when we'll be free. When everyone joins in our song and together sings in harmony, that's when we'll be free.





Closing Hymn #484

The hymn tune "MCKEE" is possibly of Irish origin, however when it was brought to the US, it was adapted by African-American slaves and associated with the spiritual "I Know the Angels Done Changed My Name." The tune found its way into hymnals after the African-American composer Harry T. Burleigh's arrangement of it appeared in the Episcopal Church's *Hymnal 1940*. Burleigh is principally remembered for his work in arranging spirituals, but is also notable for having helped the famous composer Czech composer Antonín Dvořák gather African-American music that he used in the *New World Symphony*. The text of "In Christ There is No East or West," by English hymn-writer John Oxenham, is a beautiful call to remember we all belong to one great family of humankind.


