Listening to God – The First Lesson

Reader: A reading from the Book of Exodus.



Listening to God - The Second Lesson

(please be seated)

Reader: A reading from the Second Letter to the Corinthians.

Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

OUR NEW INCUMBENT: It is with great joy the Parish Selection Committee announces that The Reverend Canon Dr. Alison Falby will be our new Incumbent, beginning September 1, 2025. Alison grew up in Toronto and is currently the incumbent at All Saints Church-Community Centre in Moss Park, where she has led a growing congregation and overseen a weekday drop-in centre for people experiencing homelessness and other challenges. She was previously the incumbent at St. Martin's, Bay Ridges, in Pickering, and a curate at St. Nicholas, Birch Cliff and Havergal College in Toronto. She was ordained priest in 2012, and graduated with her



M.Div. from Trinity College, Toronto, in 2011. Before following her call to the priesthood, Alison was an Assistant Professor of History. She holds a D.Phil. from Oxford and a B.A. from McGill University. In her spare time, she enjoys reading, pottery, and stand-up comedy. She and her husband Mike are looking forward to joining the Christ Church community in September.

GUEST PREACHERS & CELEBRANTS: Rev. Stephen is staying on as interim-priest-in-charge until the new Incumbent begins. However, Rev. Stephen is away from February 12-March 11. In the meantime, the very wonderful Rev. Cathy Gibbs will be taking on extra duties. To support her we will welcome several guest preachers and guest celebrants:

WORSHIP

SOCIAL JUSTICE

COMMUNITY BREAKFAST – LOOKING FOR WINTER CLOTHING: With winter still with us for the foreseeable future, the Breakfast program is asking for your help. CLIMATE ACTION GROUP: Heat pumps are like air conditioners, but they're more energy efficient. In the winter, they can reverse their function and act as heaters powered by electricity. Crucially, by helping to replace furnaces that run on gas or oil, heat pumps allow us to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels that are cooking our planet and making disasters like the 2021 Heat Dome in BC much more likely. Buildings are the third-largest source of greenhouse gas emissions in Canada, and we need mass adoption of heat pumps to change that. Heat pumps can also play a big role in keeping vulnerable people healthy and safe during extreme heat events.

TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: A small group of CCDP members went to the Friends House (Lowther Ave) to hear Marie Wilson discussing her recent book "North of Nowhere: Song of a Truth and Reconciliation Commissioner." It was a very thought-provoking evening as Marie discussed what it was like to be part of this enormous and important process. Interviewed by Cynthia Reyes, another former CBC journalist, Marie highlighted how her spiritual journey changed and grew as a result of this quest and the outcome of the 94 calls to action was such an important undertaking for Canada. Murray Sinclair and Wilton Littlechild were the other 2 commissioners. It is now 10 years since the calls to action was published so it is an important year to reflect on the work that still needs to be done. Strikingly the opening Indigenous words for the Creator spoke about finding the Good Way for this journey.
