





- To receive the wine from the cup, take the bottom of the cup and the base and guide it to your mouth. (Please note the dipping of bread into the wine is no longer permitted in the Anglican Diocese of Toronto.)
- If you prefer to take only the bread, you may indicate this to the cup bearer by crossing your arms over your chest, or simply walking past them.

TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: Labrador Inuit Association Day is annually on March 26 and is a time to celebrate Inuit culture, language, and traditions. It is also a time to reflect on the perseverance of the Labrador Inuit Association (LIA) which was established to protect the interests of the Labrador Inuit, focusing on land rights, Inuit language and culture, health, education, and self-determination. This day marks the founding of the LIA in 1973 and is a statutory holiday in Nunatsiavut (the Inuit Labrador region which has been named "Our Beautiful Land" in Inuktitut), recognizing the fight for Inuit rights, cultural preservation, and self-governance, and serving as a powerful reminder of Inuit strength and sovereignty.
