




Celebrating the Eucharist

Presider: Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of heaven and earth, because you bid your faithful people to cleanse their hearts and to prepare with joy for the paschal feast; that reborn through the waters of baptism and renewed in the eucharistic mystery, we may be more fervent in prayer and more generous in the works of love. Therefore we raise our voices to you in praise to proclaim the glory of your name.



Presider:

we remember his death, we proclaim his resurrection, we await his coming in glory;



- To receive the wine from the cup, take the bottom of the cup and the base and guide it to your mouth. (Please note the dipping of bread into the wine is no longer permitted in the Anglican Diocese of Toronto.)
- If you prefer to take only the bread, you may indicate this to the cup bearer by crossing your arms over your chest, or simply walking past them.






Maundy Thursday Lamb Supper

You know, some of the items that our *Relmagine Rummage* gals receive in the Atrium for our sales are just not quite up to Sale standards. This does not mean that these items should hit the Landfill. It simply means that they are a little too faded or worn. Perhaps a mark on the cuff of the sleeve, or a nick in the hem of the jeans.

Enter our tremendous **Community Breakfast team**.

At the end of February our *Relmagine Rummage* group brought a number of sweaters, jackets and footwear to the Community breakfast clothing racks in their room. By last Saturday, they were pretty much all gone. A young man came to breakfast wearing only a t-shirt for warmth on that cold morning. The breakfast team noticed, and he agreed, he would really feel better with some clothing. By accessing what we had available to them, **The Community Breakfast team** was able to send him off properly dressed for the elements of our cold end of March weather.

And to us, this is what God's work is about.

Synchronicity.

Work separately, together, to ease the burden of those who need us.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

COMMUNITY BREAKFAST – LOOKING FOR WINTER CLOTHING: With winter still with us for the foreseeable future, the Breakfast program is asking for your help. We are looking for gently used winter clothing - coats, hats, boots, scarves, gloves and especially warm socks. If you have any of these winter items that you can part ways with, our guests would certainly appreciate it. The items can be dropped off here at the church anytime. We have a box in the Atrium, just outside the administrative office. Thank you very much!

CLIMATE ACTION GROUP: The Canadian government recently committed to cutting emissions by 45 to 50 per cent below 2005 levels within the next decade. The final version of Canada's Clean Electricity Regulations (CER) will postpone the deadline for fully decarbonizing the country's electricity grids from 2035 to 2050 and scale back the power sector's emission reductions by mid-century from 342 to 181 million tonnes.

TRUTH & RECONCILIATION WORKING GROUP: In the wake of the information about the Diocese Reconciliation Land Tithe, which allocates 10% of monies received through sale of church lands, research in CCDP archive file shows the provenance of CCDP lands. From the deerparkresidents.ca website, we know that CCDP lands were not part of the original general tithing of land parcels to churches in Upper Canada. In 1802, the Crown sold 40 acres to Frederick Baron de Hoen at the northwest

corner of Cart Road (Yonge) and St Clair West, then Concession Red #3. In 1810, the Baron sold it to Mary Emsley, who in 1837 sold this parcel to Agnes Heath, who named it Deer Park. In 1846 Emsley's son Charles Wallace Heath bought the land and subdivided it into 33 lots. By the 1850s the area was a village with a few residents, a general store, a school, a cemetery, a race track and a hotel. On June 6, 1870, a meeting was held at the Davisville School to consider how to establish an Anglican Church in or near the village. You will have seen the photographs of the first Christ Church Deer Park. Much of the CCDP archive documents arrangements for the triangle of land adjacent to CCDP needed by the city to widen Yonge Street. It seems unlikely that any CCDP land will be up for sale in the near future, so CCDP is unlikely to be able to contribute to the Reconciliation Land Tithe.
